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2014 Razorback and Lady Razorback

The 21st running of the Razorback and Lady Razorback, which had always been run at Louisiana Downs, until this year, seems to have been a good move according to the reports that have come in. Members have said they had a good time and found the people at Remington Park to be very friendly and accommodating. Thank you to Mike Shamburg, Remington Park Racing Secretary, for helping make this move possible.

The Razorback went off with only 5 betting



entries, Stormy's Kid having scratched prior to the race. TOUCHDOWN ARKANSAS, by Artie Schiller - Ms. Officer Rocket, by Officer, bred by Lewis Mathews, Jr.,

owned by Lewis Mathews, Jr. and Frank Fletcher Racing Operations and trained by Tom Howard, broke in stride, was taken in hand and rated on the front end between horses, moved clear when allowed on the turn, came into the lane from path three, lengthened his lead and held off INDYGO BO under a mild drive. INDY GO BO was kept close just off the inside, waited for room on the turn, got through two wide into the lane, moved to the rain upper stretch, all out, closed the gap late and proved easily second best. ALL ABOARD prominent from outside, came four wide into the land and could only draw off for third. WHERE'S LEWIS contested the pace from inside on the backstretch, could not keep up on the turn and flattened out for the drive. OUR FIFTYFIFTYSTAR raced in the second flight between horses, also waited for room on the turn, began to fade leaving the bend, angled out inside the last eight and continued to yield.

The 21st running of the Lady Razorback ran with a field of 10; PATCHOFBADWEATHER, by Storm and a Half - Preflorada (ARG), by Choir Prospect, bred by John F. Anthony, owned by Flurry Racing Stables, LLC and trained by Karl Broberg shared the led from outside, was two

wide on the turn, moved clear when asked in the lane, held sway but had to be vanned off in distress after



the race. AUNT CRIS'SSHOES was kept close, three wide on the turn then could only make up minor ground on the leader from outside deep stretch. BE MY CAROLINE contested the pace from inside but gradually wore down for the SWAN DEER was away slowly, advanced from inside, two wide on the turn and was slowly closing the gap the final eighth. SHADYNSTELLA was steadied behind traffic on the backstretch, in path three on the turn, passed between tired ones in the stretch. INNOCENT STORM chased in midpack, was three wide through the bend and lacked a stretch bid. LITTLE SHOES saved ground and failed to menace. CHRISTINA RENEE was an early factor between rivals, two wide on the turn then flattened out the last quarter mile RELI-GIOUS four wide on the bend, had no late bid. JERSEY soon faded between rivals and had little to offer in the lane.

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THE JOCKEY CLUB encourages use of the Jockey Club Interactive Registry. Submit your live foal reports on line. It's so easy. Jockey Club Rules regarding Live Foal/No Foal

reports state:

Live Foal/No Foal Report (LF/NF). "Within 30 days of the birth of a foal, the owner, breeder or authorized agent must complete a Live Foal/No Foal Report. The LF/NF indicates the exact date of foaling, the sex of the foal and the state or Canadian province where the foal was born. It is at this stage of the registration process, that the breeder of the foal and correct address for receiving correspondence and the Certificate of Foal Registration must be supplied. In the event the breeding did not result in pregnancy or the pregnancy was lost during gestation, a No Foal Report should be completed and submitted to The Jockey Club as soon as possible.

Stakes Nomination Fees MUST BE PAID BY SEPARATE CHECK.

Nomination payments CAN NOT be combined with any other registration and/or membership dues payments.

Failure to pay nomination payments by separate check will result in your check being returned to you for reissuance

TO ALL BREEDERS & OWNERS:

Registration & Nominations

All 2014 Arkansas-bred foal registrations MUST BE SUBMITTED BY DECEMBER 31st to avoid increased registration fees.

December 31st is the deadline for yearling foal's nominations into the Arkansas-bred Stakes Program.

After that, late nomination fees apply.

A foal's Jockey Club registration DOES NOT have to be completed before the Arkansas-bred foal registration is submitted to ATBHA.



Some of her stakes winners included Cherokee Vail in 1992, Quija in 1993, Noxie in 1994, Dust On the Bottle in 1999 & 2000, and Stoney Jody, 1999. Dust on the Bottle was most recognized for his win in the Grade II Hawthorne Gold Cup Handicap.

The Hilds stood Hurricane Ed at their farm. In 1991 and 1994 he was named ATBHA's Stallion of the Year. Our condolences are with the Hild family.

STAKES NOMINATION INFORMATION FOR REGISTERED ARKANSAS-BRED THOROUGHBREDS

NOMINATION DATES AND FEES for Registered Arkansas-bred foals:

To nominate your registered Arkansas-bred to future futurity and stakes races, restricted to Registered Arkansas-breds, please complete a Nomination Form and submit it to ATBHA as follows:

A one-time Nomination Payment of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) shall be paid to ATBHA, accompanied by a completed Nomination Form, on or before **December 31st** of the foal's yearling year. This payment will nominate and make this foal eligible to run in any and all futurity and stakes races restricted to Arkansas-breds during his/her racing career.

For all foals not nominated by December 31st of their yearling year, a one-time Late Nomination Payment of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) shall be paid to ATBHA, accompanied by a completed Nomination Form, at any time prior to the horse being entered in any futurity or stakes race restricted to Registered Arkansas-breds. This will nominate and make this Registered Arkansas-bred eligible to run in any and all future Stakes races restricted to Registered Arkansas-breds during his/her racing career.

* A sustaining nomination, with NO FEE, shall be required on all stakes races at Oaklawn Park.

If no sustaining nomination is timely made, a supplementary nomination may be made with a fee of \$200 prior to entry.

HOW TO IDENTIFY A THOROUGHBRED - PART 1 - To be used to complete The Jockey Club Application Markings

(Taken from Jockey Club Interactive Registration www.registry.jockeyclub.com

NOTE: Where "figure" is shown beside an entry below - if you were on the website looking at this, you can click on the "figure" notation and it will show you an example.

Coat Colors Of Thoroughbreds

The following colors are recognized by The Jockey Club:

Bay: The entire coat of the horse may vary from a yellow-tan to a bright auburn. The mane, tail and lower portion of the legs are always black, unless white markings are present.

Black: The entire coat of the horse is black, including the muzzle, the flanks, the mane, tail and legs, unless white markings are present.

Chestnut: The entire coat of the horse may vary from a red-yellow to a golden-yellow. The mane, tail and legs are usually variations of coat color, unless white markings are present.

Dark Bay/Brown: The entire coat of the horse will vary from a brown, with areas of tan on the shoulders, head and flanks, to a dark brown, with tan areas seen only in the flanks and/or muzzle. The mane, tail and lower portion of the legs are always black, unless white markings are present.

Gray/Roan: In order to reduce the number of corrections involving the colors gray and roan, The Jockey Club has combined these colors into one color category. This does not change the individual definitions of the colors for gray and roan and in no way impacts on the two-coat color inheritance principle as stated in Rule 1(E).

Gray: The majority of the coat of the horse is a mixture of black and white hairs. The mane, tail and legs may be either black or gray, unless white markings are present.

Roan: The majority of the coat of the horse is a mixture of red and white hairs or brown and white hairs. The mane, tail and legs may be black, chestnut or roan, unless white markings are present.

Palomino: The entire coat of the horse is golden-yellow, unless white markings are present. The mane and tail are usually flaxen.

White: The entire coat, including the mane, tail and legs, is predominantly white.

Head Markings

This section provides a basic language and examples of common markings that simplify the identification procedure. The use of terminology found in this document will standardize horse markings and expedite processing by The Jockey Club.

FEW WHITE HAIRS - When present, they should be noted and their exact location described.

SCATTERED WHITE HAIRS - numerous white hairs which do not form any specific shape. The words "heavy" or "faint" can sometimes be used in describing scattered white hairs.

PATCH OF WHITE HAIRS - a close gathering of white hairs, scattered white hairs or solid white hairs. As a general guideline, a patch of white hairs in the forehead is small enough that it can be covered by a person's thumbnail.

STAR - any major white marking found in the forehead and/or eye level.

The following terms can be used when describing STARS:

Small Star (Fig. No. 7) - a star which measures less than one and one-half inches in diameter.

Large Star (Fig. No. 8) - a star which measures three inches or more in diameter.

Diamond Shaped Star (Fig. No. 9) - shaped like a diamond.

Diagonal Star Pointed to Left (Pointed to Right) - usually narrow in shape, the top of which points toward the horse's left or right ear. The direction of the upper point should always be noted.

Horizontal Star - usually narrow in shape and lies parallel to the imaginary line connecting the top of both eyes.

Vertical Star - A star whose general shape is "up and down."

Curved Star Open to Left (Open to Right, Open to Top, Open to Bottom) (Fig. No. 12) - usually narrow and shaped like the letter "C" or a crescent moon. The "open" side of the star should always be noted.

Oval Star (Fig. No. 10) - a rounded or egg-shaped star.

Heart Shaped Star - shaped like a heart.

Triangular Star - shaped like a triangle.

Irregular Star - this term should be used when the star does not conform to any specific shape.

Pointed Star - a star which contains two or more distinct points. -- If a star contains only one distinct point (Fig. No. 11), then the direction of the point should be noted (pointed to left, pointed to right, etc.).

Mixed Star (Fig. No. 14) - a mixture of white and coat color hairs in the shape of a star. Sometimes these stars can be difficult to distinguish, and in this case, should be described as a faint star.

Bordered Star (Fig. No. 13) - the outer edge of the star is a mixture of white and coat color hairs.

Bald Face (Fig. No. 20) - The star and stripe cover both eyes, both nostrils and the muzzle.

<u>STRIPE</u> - a continuous vertical marking which can begin anywhere from the area between the eyes to just above the imaginary horizontal line connecting the top of the nostrils.

The following terms can be used when describing STRIPES:

Thin Stripe/Narrow Stripe (Fig. No. 16-lower portion) - about a half inch in width. If the stripe is very thin it should be described as a Line of White Hairs. Wide Stripe/Broad Stripe (Fig. No. 18) - about two or three inches in width.

Mixed Stripe - contains a mixture of white and coat color hairs. Can be narrow, wide, etc.

Bordered Stripe (Fig. No. 13) - the outer edge of the stripe is a mixture of white and coat color hairs. Can be narrow, wide, etc.

Bordered Flesh Colored Stripe - the outer edge of the stripe contains solid white or mixed white hairs, while the center of the stripe is pink in color. Can be narrow wide etc.

Broken Stripe (Fig. No. 17) - The stripe is disconnected from itself at one or more points.

Tapering Stripe - a stripe which narrows continuously and ends in a point.

Irregular Stripe - a stripe whose width, direction and course vary.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR DESCRIBING STRIPES:

Always describe where the stripe begins. If connected to a star, use the phrase "AND CONNECTED." Example: Large star and connected broad stripe... If the stripe is a separate marking, describe its beginning point using one of the following phrases: at eye level, at bottom of eye level, below eye level, in center of face, on bridge of nose, above nostrils.

Always describe where the stripe ends. Use one of the following phrases: at eye level, at bottom of eye level, below eye level, in center of face, on bridge of nose, above nostrils, between nostrils, on upper lip.

Use any of the following words to describe the stripe as it travels from beginning to end: beginning, widening narrowing, extending, becom- ing, ending. When using any of these words, make sure to note what part of the horse's head is being described: center of face, bridge of nose, etc.

Whenever a stripe extends or ends between the nostrils, state whether the marking is TOUCHING, extends INTO or is COVERING the LEFT NOSTRIL, the RIGHT NOSTRIL or BOTH NOSTRILS. The same guide- line applies when describing any SNIP BETWEEN NOSTRILS.

SNIP - any disconnected marking found BETWEEN THE NOSTRILS. A snip can be solid white, flesh colored or bordered. (See above for the definition of "bordered" and other terms used to describe markings).

PATCH - any separate marking found on the upper lip, lower lip or under lip. A patch can be solid white, flesh colored or mixed.

THIS IS ONE CAREFULLY DESIGNED SCAM

- 1. You arrive at your hotel and check in at the front desk. Typically when checking in, you give the front desk your credit card (for any charges to your room).
- 2. You go to your room and settle in. All is good.
- 3. The hotel receives a call and the caller asks for (as an example) room 620 - which happens to be your room.
- The phone rings in your room. You answer and the person on the other end says the following: This is the front desk. When checking in, we came across a problem with your charge card information. Please re-read me your credit card number and verify the last 3 digits numbers at the reverse side of your charge card.
- 5. Not thinking anything wrong, since the call seems to come from the front desk you oblige. But actually, it is a scam by someone calling from outside the hotel. They have asked for a random room number, then ask you for your credit card and address information. They sound so professional, that you think you are talking to the front desk.

If you ever encounter this scenario on your travels, tell the caller that you will be down to the front desk to clear up any problems. Then, go to the front desk or call directly and ask if there was a problem. If there was none, inform the manager of the hotel that someone tried to scam you of your credit card information, acting like a front desk employee.

This was provided by someone who has been duped......and is still cleaning up the mess.

P.S. Please, consider spreading the word by relating this to your friends and/or family. Who knows, you might just help someone avoid a nasty experience.

ANYONE traveling should be aware of this one!

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER: A majority of good, concise head markings can be written using only the terms as outlined in this section. Be sure to identify each major marking and use the descriptive words and phrases whenever necessary.

Cowlicks

A cowlick is the center of a hair whorl. They are permanent and cannot be brushed away or clipped out. Cowlicks on the head and neck area are a very useful means of identification and should be described on all horses. Any photos of the face should show the location, shape, and/or outline of the cowlick(s) as much as possible.

There is at least one cowlick in the forehead, not counting the one at the foretop. The foretop cowlick is not useful in identification as it has been found that all horses have a cowlick in this area.

Cowlicks at or near eye level should be described in relation to the eye level (above eye level, at top of eye level, at eye level, at bottom of eye level, below eye level) and also in relation to the midline (left of midline, right of midline, or "median" cowlick). Cowlicks can also be described in relation to white markings found in the head (for example: median cowlick in star; cowlick to left at bottom of star, etc.).

When two or more cowlicks are found in the forehead they should be described as being a double horizontal cowlick, a double diagonal cowlick or a double vertical cowlick. These cowlicks should also be described in terms of their relation to eye level and to the midline.

The presence of a cowlick on the side of the neck near the mane should always be noted. This becomes even more important on solid-colored horses (horses with no white markings).

There is at least one cowlick on each side of the neck near the mane. Each neck cowlick should be described in terms of its location on the neck, (behind the poll, high at crest of neck, middle of crest of neck, low at crest of neck), and on which side of the neck they lie (left side, right side, both sides).

Other cowlicks which aid in the identification process can be found at the throat latch, in one or both jugular grooves and on the front of the neck.

Sometimes cowlicks feather outward from the point of origin, and the word "feathered" can be used to describe such a cowlick.

Leg Markings

Markings found on the legs can be described by one or more of the following:

FEW WHITE HAIRS - can be found on any portion of the legs. When present, they should be noted and their exact location described.

SCATTERED WHITE HAIRS - can be found on any portion of the legs. The words "numerous," "heavy" or "faint" can sometimes be used in describing scattered white hairs.

PATCH OF WHITE HAIRS (Fig. No. 35) - can be large or small and is found on any portion of the legs, especially on the heels or coronet. The words "solid" or "mixed" can sometimes be used when describing a patch of white hairs.

INSIDE OR OUTSIDE HEEL WHITE (Fig. No. 21) - Only one of the heels on a leg is white.

HEEL WHITE (Fig. No. 22) - Both heels on a leg are white.

CORONET WHITE (Fig. No. 23) - The area immediately above the hoof (one inch or less in width) is white.

CORONET AND PART OF PASTERN WHITE (Fig. No. 24) - The white covers the coronet, extends up and includes part of the pastern.

HALF PASTERN WHITE (Fig. No. 25) - The white covers the lower one half of the pastern.

THREE-QUARTERS PASTERN WHITE (Fig. No. 26) - The white covers the lower three quarters of the pastern.

PASTERN WHITE (Fig. No. 27) - The white covers the entire pastern.

PASTERN AND PART OF ANKLE WHITE (Fig. No. 28) - The white extends up and includes part of the ankle.

HALF ANKLE WHITE - The white extends up and covers the lower one half of the ankle.

ANKLE WHITE (Fig. No. 29) -The white extends up to and includes the entire ankle.

WHITE TO ABOVE ANKLE (Fig. No. 30) - The white extends up to and includes the entire ankle and a small portion (less than one quarter) of the cannon bone.

QUARTER WHITE STOCKING - The white extends up to and includes the lower one guarter of the cannon bone.

HALF STOCKING (Fig. No. 31) - The white extends up to and includes the lower one half of the cannon bone.

THREE-QUARTERS STOCKING (Fig. No. 32) - The white extends up to and includes the lower three quarters of the cannon bone.

FULL STOCKING (Fig. No. 33) - The white extends up to and includes the entire cannon bone. It extends to the bottom of the knee on the front leg and to the bottom of the hock on the hind leg. If any white extends onto or above the knee on the front leg (Fig. No. 34) or onto or above the hock on the hind leg it should be so described.

DARK OR CHESTNUT SPOTS IN WHITE LEG MARKINGS (Fig. No. 26), (Fig. No. 27), (Fig. No. 28) - Sometimes coat color spots are present in the white marking. Usually they are found on a white coronet, however, they can occasionally be found in other parts of the marking. These spots should be described as to their color and location. If only one spot is present its exact location should be noted.

Irregular Leg Markings

If a white leg marking is too irregular to fall into one of the previously described classifications then a combination must be used to describe that marking. Thus, Fig. No. 36 may be described as a half pastern white, extending on ankle in back; dark spot on coronet on outside; Fig. No. 37 may be described as ankle white, higher in back; large triangular dark patch on coronet on outside, extending on pastern; dark spot on coronet in front; Fig. No. 38 may be described as pastern and part of ankle irregularly white, extending above ankle in back; line of white hairs on cannon on outside.

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER: A majority of good, concise leg descriptions can be written by using only the terms as outlined in this section. Be sure to identify the major marking, use the descriptive phrases when necessary and state which area of the leg is being described.

Body Markings

Odd body markings should be described as to color, size and location. Examples of this include DARK SPOTS in the horse's coat, a large DARK PATCH on the body or a large WHITE PATCH on the body.

Sometimes SCATTERED WHITE HAIRS can be found on the horse's body. Examples of this include SCATTERED WHITE HAIRS ON BARREL, IN FLANKS, AT ROOT OF TAIL or THROUGHOUT COAT.

Dimples

Indentations in muscles just under the skin which are easily seen and are permanent. They are usually found at the point of one or both shoulders and in the neck muscles.

Acquired Markings

Markings that have been produced after birth are considered acquired markings. Tattoos, scars and firing marks are the most common examples.

MICROCHIPS - When used in conjunction with other current means of identification, such as markings, genetic typing, color photographs, and lip tattoos, microchips can provide additional confidence when identifying a Thoroughbred.

TATTOO - The tattoo is a letter and a group of numbers applied to the underside of the upper lip. Imported horses have an asterisk rather than a letter in their tattoo. Sometimes horses may be found with tattoos on their lower lip.

SCARS - Many scars are permanent and can be seen throughout the life of the horse; they should therefore be noted.

FIRING MARKS -The operation of firing the legs of a horse leaves permanent scars.

Characteristics

Certain horses are born having specific characteristics which are useful in distinguishing one from another. When present they should be added to the identification notes. Following are some of the more common ones:

LOP-EARED - A lop-eared horse does not carry his ears erect, they usually hang at a 45 or 90 degree angle.

ROMAN-NOSED - Convex area between the eyes and the muzzle.

WALL-EYE - A wall-eyed horse is one that has a light blue or pinkish iris rather than the usual brown. Other terms are watch-eye or glass-eye.

PARROT-MOUTH -Upper teeth extend forward beyond the lower (overshot).

SWAY-BACK - An exaggerated concavity between the withers and the rump.

PIGEON-TOED - Hoofs pointed inward and towards each other (toes in).

SPLAY-FOOTED - Hoofs pointed outward and away from each other (toes out).

KNEE-SPRUNG - Knees bent forward when viewed from the side. Other terms are over at the knees or bench-kneed.

CALF-KNEES - Knees bent back and in towards each other. The opposite of Knee-Sprung. Another term is back on his knees.

NIGHT EYES

Night-eyes (or chestnuts) are horny, irregular growths found on the inside of the legs. On the fore legs, they are just above the knees and on the hind legs, they are near the rear of the hock. No two horses have been found to have the same set of night-eyes and since they do not change in size and shape throughout the adult life of the horse they are found to be extremely useful in identification. The Jockey Club may ask for a set of night-eye photos to assist in the identification of horses with no white markings or gray/roans. These photos should reveal as much detail as safely possible to indicate location, shape, and outline.

FROM THE ATBHA OFFICE

Well, now it's our busy time of year. Make sure you get your 2014 foals registered with ATBHA **ON OR BEFORE December 31, 2014**. If you miss that deadline it means you'll be paying a lot more money to get your thoroughbred babies Arkansas registered! If paid after that date, a foal registration will increase and cost \$200 instead of \$40, and that doesn't include a broodmare's late registration. Also, don't miss the December 31st nomination deadline for 2013 foals to be nominated into the Arkansas-bred Stakes program. Missing that date will also cost you a lot more money too ... \$300 vs. \$2,500!!! Please pay registration fees and nomination fees in two separate checks.

Please make sure we have your correct mailing address. ATBHA will receive The Jockey Club databases in January and will be working on 2014 awards distributions. The checks should be mailed out by the end of March. If ATBHA has a current address you are assured of getting your awards checks without delay. If not, your check could be floating around the world from post office to post office.
